GERMAN SHEPHERD DOG RESCUE

Hello everyone,

Well here we are half way through the year and it's not just the weather that's hotting up, there's just no stopping Team GSDR. The weekend 6/7th July has set a new record for the rescue, with teams of GSDR volunteers out in the blistering hot weather across the country organising and attending events that have raised much needed funds so that we can help more needy dogs. More about these events in the newsletter.

I would like to give a special mention for our Two Fat Blokes who raised a staggering £1282.55 in just 2 days. Our fundraisers Oop North certainly have set the bar but watch out because our Eastern Fundraising team have the bit between their teeth with a program of planned events and the Southern Fundraising Team is also now up and running. Not only do our fundraising teams bring in funds to the rescue, they also do an amazing PR job for both the rescue and the breed. A very special thanks to all those dogs attending events and for behaving so beautifully in public especially in such hot weather.

With the very hot weather set to continue, please make sure our four legged friends stay cool and safe. If you see a dog anywhere that might be in distress in any way because of the heat, please act quickly, you could save a life.

We have been busy sourcing new merchandise too, which also generates profit for the rescue so we hope you like our new range of goods. If you have any ideas for new merchandise, give us a shout.

Again it has been a very busy month with 225 adoption applications, 114 new dogs requiring rehoming and 36 new volunteer applications. In some areas we have dramatically reduced the number of dogs in kennels, although we still have too many stuck in kennels long term, still waiting for their forever home.



On a sad note for me personally, we lost our Woody very suddenly on June 23rd. Woody was a cruelty case who endured a very traumatised early life and who was very mentally scarred by his ordeal, which made him a rather difficult dog at times. He settled here with us in 2010, he was a happy dog in his own little Woody world and truly had a unique character. Life really will never be the same without our own special boy. RIP until we meet again my lad.

In times of austerity, I know just how tough it is becoming for all of us which is why I want to say a massive thank you to all GSDR volunteers who contribute so much to the rescue and make it the success that it is.

Our Little Coco

This poor little girl is very poorly indeed. She came into our care just over a week ago and it very guickly became apparent that she wasn't well. When Wayne went to collect her, he was introduced to No Name, a puppy who'd had three homes in her short nine months. She was terribly underweight, weighing less than 10 kilos and it soon became obvious why. No Name - renamed Coco was unable to keep any food down. After a few visits to the vets to establish the cause of her condition Coco went downhill at the weekend. She was admitted as an emergency overnight where she had a barium meal and x-rays. The diagnosis is that she has an obstruction at the base of her heart caused by abnormal vascular development - a condition known as persistent right aortic arch or PRAA. On Sunday evening her condition worsened, she was incredibly weak. Wayne rushed her to Chester Gates Referral Hospital where she has been admitted. She was severely dehydrated on admittance which is why she was so lifeless. She had terrible sickness and diarrhoea until the early hours but she is now stabilising is a little brighter. She was put on a drip straight away and received a lot of fluid, plus she has been given anti-emetics to stop her feeling sick. Sadly she has also tested positive for Parvovirus, this was an unexpected set back and will delay her surgery until she's beaten this terrible bug. The hospital have reviewed the X-rays and the vet has made it quite clear that at her age, the Oesophagus will never return to normal, this surgery should have been performed at a much vounger age. She should however have a much better quality of life but will require a special feeding regime.

We have made it clear to the hospital that GSDR want them to do everything they can for this little girl, we will raise the money no matter what. If Coco doesn't have this surgery then she simply won't survive, this little girl deserves a chance. Coco is receiving around the clock nursing care and is fighting on, the hospital are doing everything they can for her but she's not out of the woods yet. Late last night we had some positive news that she was a bit brighter and she'd wagged her tail.

So far the estimated costs of her treatment and surgery is in excess of £5,000. While Coco is fighting on then so shall we, everything will be done to try to save this sweet little girl. We've started a fundraising appeal for her veterinary care, please support us if you can, every £ helps .

Heat stroke can be fatal, if you suspect your dog has been affected you should contact your vet immediately.

Signs of heat stroke in dogs:

- Try to walk your dog in the cool of the morning or evening and if you really must walk at lunchtime choose a sheltered lane or wood. Never allow your dog to exercise excessively in hot weather
- Your dog will enjoy a shady spot to lie in but during the hottest part of the day they might be more comfortable indoors
- If your dog goes off their food try to feed them later in the evening when it is cooler and you will usually find their appetites return
- Make sure your dog always has a supply of clean drinking water. Always carry water with you on hot days and give your dog frequent small amounts


How you can support us

We received a rehoming request from a family who were emigrating to America and could not take their much loved family dog Cici with them. Knowing that city living in an apartment wouldn't suit their dog they wanted to be unselfish so made the very difficult decision to rehome her. Lisa Scott contacted one of our volunteers who completed the dog assessment and took photos so we could find her a new loving home.

Meanwhile we had a lovely gentleman called Frank contact us enquiring about adoption as he'd recently lost his beloved dog. He was so lost without a dog that he and his wife desperately wanted to find a new companion. Poor Frank was heartbroken, still walking every day taking the old routes he once walked with his old dog. Introducing Our Team
