

GERMAN SHEPHERD DOG RESCUE

Hello everyone,

Easter has come and gone, spring is allegedly here but what a cold chilly one it's turning out to be. We had a quiet spell over Easter which is usual but things have picked up again and hopefully more dogs will soon be matched to their new forever homes.

Despite Easter, in April we received 268 adoption applications compared to 178 in 2016 which is way up on last year. We also received 68 rehoming forms compared to 72 last year, so that remains pretty steady but does not include dogs taken in from the pounds etc.

We do however still have far too many kennel dwellers with many of those having been in kennels six months or more. This is not the life for any dog, especially a large breed dog. We hope people will consider our overlooked dogs, all of whom have ended up in rescue through no fault of their own. They are not bad dogs, they don't have issues, they were just made homeless and we had to put them in kennels to keep them safe until new homes are found.

We have now also become known for rehoming Caucasian Shepherds too and we are getting requests to rehome unwanted dogs, many of who have been abandoned and picked up as strays with unregistered foreign microchips. This is yet another breed now being exploited so we are happy to help these dogs although this is not the breed that we would ever consider putting into your average pet home. The Caucasians that we have rehomed have all gone to lovely rural homes with plenty of space for these large dogs. The number we have helped is a very small percentage of the total number of dogs we rehome annually. I personally have had 5 of these dogs and two of our kennels also now have experience with the breed.

On the fundraising front, this will as always be a very busy year so that we can generate more funds to help more needy dogs. We are looking closely at the type of fundraising activities that we have done in the past and will not be doing some of the events we have previously attended as they are not proving to be worthwhile given the cost of attending and the amount of effort required to generate relatively small sums of money. GSDR volunteers are very resourceful and have much better ideas on how to fundraise more efficiently so watch this space.

Once again I thank all the hard working, dedicated volunteers who make GSDR the success that it is.




When Linda Wood appealed for donations of items suitable for her car boot stall, the members of her Chelmsford Walk group rallied round and donated goods which she flogged for over £150!

What a Difference a Week Makes by Ann Leigh Eastern Region

I lived through all this and I am still reeling in disbelief at the sheer enormity of what can be achieved when people of goodwill work together and then the Universe takes a hand as well!

Only a week before this poor boy, who became known as 'the Waif', was in trouble – the being PTS kind.

He had been picked up by the police in South Norfolk, across the county on the Wednesday, lodged with a local vet overnight, and then was transferred by the dog warden to the kennels that they use, down the road from me. He was in the most severe pain. He had a skin problem, which was clearly agonizing and advanced ear canker. He was in the most pathetic physical and mental state imaginable.



Jayne found out about him from the dog warden's post on Facebook. She contacted us in Eastern and I phoned the warden, firstly on the Friday. By this time, the Waif had seen a vet who had prescribed minimal treatment, just basic pain relief. It is the policy of local authorities to make dogs, in their care, for the statutory seven days, comfortable – but that is all. I was told that it was difficult to say anything much about this boy. He was in such pain that he was just 'looking inward', completely absorbed by his pain, as we all do in such circumstances.

He showed no interest in anyone, or in life itself. It was even hard to handle him as there was nowhere on his body where he could be touched to move him at all. He was just being kept as comfortable as possible, until his time was up - in both senses. He was due to be PTS first thing on the Monday morning.

I assured the warden that we would take over ownership of the Waif, provided that he was capable of living a decent quality of life, with treatment. I was concerned in case the canker had destroyed the inner ear and this would involve extensive surgery and a long painful rehabilitation, as a frail elderly suddenly deaf dog. I asked the warden to negotiate with the vets and the local authority to allow the Waif to be thoroughly examined, under anaesthetic, and then treated appropriately, if viable. I managed to persuade them to trust GSDR that we would be responsible for all costs. Thank goodness for our 'respectable' public profile!

The next thing over the weekend was to find this poor boy some help. Fortunately a well wisher came forward to donate his vet fees and then on going veterinary care. I turned to then to our 'angels', Tom and Angela, here in eastern and approached them (such a big ask) about the possibility of fostering the Waif. Their only reply was, 'Where is this dog and when do you want us to pick him up'.

We call Tom and Angela 'our angels because quite simply they are that. This arose from a chance reference to Angela's name and their devotion to many other waifs. Amongst these, was another dog in just the same condition as the Waif. They nursed him back to glowing health and he is now a credit to the breed. He is not only well but has proved to be stunningly handsome as well.

The only issue was whether the Waif could live with them happily. They already have a houseful of other pets. If he had proved to be insanely aggressive, once he recovered, this would have been too much for them without an external kennel. I then lined up another foster placement that might cope if ... but happily all of this proved to be unnecessary.

When the time came for the Waif to be taken to the vets everyone was impressed by how much he had improved already just on the basic course of painkillers. His examination confirmed that, with treatment, he would be able to live a full and happy life. So armed with medicinal shampoos and medications, he left the vets to wait for his new owners to come to pick him up

Yes really.


In the meantime, the GSDR system worked for this boy and a lovely couple emerged from the process. They had only been homechcked that weekend and it was thought that they might be interested in another dog of ours. Happily, that plan fell through, when the owners decided suddenly that they could not bear to part with him. So, then I phoned to tell them all the about the Waif. We did know by then that he was a sweet natured boy. I had had good reports from the vet and the warden and I had been down earlier that day to do a lightening dog assessment myself, still thinking that he would be going to a foster home. Instead, I had a wonderful potential pair of adopters who said that they wanted to help an older dog, who was in need of love and care.

It was a lot to ask of them. The Waif was certainly in need. By the time that I saw him, he had been shampooed and medicated was becoming his normal self, now that the pain had lessened. He was obviously sweet natured and gentle and I was confident that he was eminently rehomeable. But, he was still a heartbreaking sight. He seems to have a giant head on his skeletal body. You feel as though you could span his waist with your hands, and as he is a big boy, he seems all the more gaunt for this.

I tried to describe him honestly to his potential adopters but I was stopped in my tracks. 'Ann, he is in trouble and we can give him the love and care that he needs. Can we come to fetch him to-morrow?'

And the rest is history ... Basically, the next day, they all fell into each others' arms and Max (as he had become) left delightedly with them for his forever home, where he continues to delight everyone he meets.

A lot can happen in a week.





Volunteers come in all shapes and sizes and have all sorts of different skills - some are not human even. I mean that our beloved GSDs do create interest and help recruit well wishers and volunteers and assist in all sorts of ways besides.

But the human kind of volunteers are diverse to say the least. They range from housebound (because of looking after the dogs) old fogeys like me to young super enthusiastic workers.

A bunch of these in Ipswich, suddenly, had the brilliant idea of using their friendship network and energy and enthusiasm to make money for our cause. Wow!!! They could be couch potatoes or party animals or doing whatever else it is that people get up to. But no, they are organising a fundraiser, completely as self starters. I promise, no arm twisting from Jayne or myself and not even a whinge or pathetic plea - this all came from them.

All sponsor forms and money will need to be given on arrival in an envelope.




Lady when she first arrived in foster (left) and 5 weeks later
