

GERMAN SHEPHERD DOG RESCUE

Hello everyone,,

As we race towards the end of yet another year, time to reflect on what we have achieved and the monumental task we face as a rescue both now and going forward into a new year.

Despite the number of rescues now operating in the UK, we are still seeing far too many dogs that need to find homes and the reasons for rehoming are getting ridiculous. People are buying these dogs without adequately researching the breed, they are not prepared to put in the training to teach their dog how to behave and then they use rescue to offload their problem dogs. Dogs are now regarded as commodities instead of sentient beings.

Although we are getting record numbers of adoption applications, we face different problems to what we did a few years ago. People don't want older dogs, they don't want dogs with medical issues and they want perfectly behaved dogs. Many potential new owners simply are not prepared to put in any effort with behavioural issues.

This means we have far too many dogs sitting in commercial boarding kennels running up substantial kennel bills because they are not quite perfect or match the shopping list given to us by potential new adopters.

It's so sad to see dogs in kennels waiting to be adopted, some of whom have been Incarcerated for over a year. Tosca is spending her third Xmas in kennels - how sad is that? Despite the tough tasks they face, volunteers are working harder than ever before, often having to deal with rude and difficult people.

Once again I would like to thank all the volunteers and fundraisers who have made GSDR the success that it is.

On a personal level, this has been a difficult month as Kola our 10-year-old black GSD suffered a bloat which is the first I have ever seen. Thankfully I recognised the symptoms and got him to the vets straight away where he underwent surgery and is now



fully recovered. But worse was yet to come. You may all remember Sally, the pregnant dog that was abandoned and tied to a tree. Her 8 pups came to us and all were rehomed except Lad who stayed with us. Entirely out of the blue his health began to fail, we discovered that he had an inherited disease known as Juvenile Nephropathy and his kidneys were failing. We had to make the awful decision to have him put to sleep at the age of just 2. We will never forget this little dog, he held a very special place in our hearts and we have many happy and fond memories of him despite his health ups and downs. At least he knew what it was like to be loved, but not all dogs are so lucky.

Please rescue and please consider one of our long-term kennel dwellers, so they too will know what it is like to be loved and cared for.



















Of course they found the mud and water...

Bella and Buddy: a Love Story by Ann Leigh

Dog rescue is emotionally gruelling – even at our 'soft end' of the spectrum. We have lots of wonderful successes but it is our 'failures' that haunt us. We might have two dozen successes in a month but the one failure is the one that we remember!

So, it is good to record the successes and the tale of Bella and Buddy is more than that of two rescues – although important enough as that. This is a love story.

I will always remember 'Gitere'. There is a post on Facebook of a grinning Staffie pair. One says to the other something like, 'I'm called 'Put that down' or sometimes, 'Stop doing that'. The pair are so clearly well loved dogs that this is funny and we can all relate to the joke. I laughed when I saw it, but never dreamed that I would come across this in real life. Even when I saw the paperwork and read her name I still couldn't believe what I saw. This wonderful young bitch had been called 'Gitere'. You still don't get it? In the civilized speech it would be, 'Get here'. It took me quite a while to work it out: I was paralyzed mentally by disbelief! This time it wasn't funny.

We had been requested to rehome 'Gitere' as her owner told us that he was moving house and had to be out by the end of the week. We did not believe him but we knew that 'Gitere' had to leave. This excuse for a human being told us that he had called all his dogs 'Gitere', as that was what they answered to. He clearly had zero empathy or recognition of a dog as a sentient being, much less as a beloved family member. This poor girl lived outside on the veranda where she had her bed. We were told that she was allowed into the kitchen and hall occasionally. Isn't it often the sweetest natured dogs that are so abused? Gitere was lovely and needed our help.

I put an emergency post on Facebook and had two offers of a foster home immediately. One of these was from Mandi Wilks, who lived within driving distance. She offered to pick 'Gitere' up that night and immediately set about rescuing her. It was only later that I learned that she was taking antibiotics at the time for pleurisy. Nothing will stop Mandi when a dog is in trouble.

I knew that Mandi had recently lost her long time family member Rebel. He left a big hole. Could this poor little waif possibly fill that? She was a timid, malnourished, ignorant little thing. Mandy's pack of 'rat dogs' would probably adapt but how would Mandy's other emergency rescue, Buddy, react to her? She had stolen our hearts but how would Buddy feel after losing his old play partner? He and Rebel were the same size and wrestled and bounded around together as equals. Buddy needed another dog that could do this. He was an emergency rescue from some time ago and a challenging boy in many ways. And how would Gitere react to an awesome Buddy? She was frightened of her own shadow and didn't know anything of other dogs or even houses. Absolutely everything was new to her.

How often do I say to people, 'Time is your best ally'. Mandi, of course, let Gitere (soon to be Bella) come into the centre of her home in her own time. She spent her early days cowering away in another room and, when in the kitchen, surfed the work tops. She knew nothing. She only sensed that she had a mum, now, and when Mandi brought her into the sitting room finally, she lay by her side just licking her endlessly. She was relieved to be loved and needed to be reassured about all the other dogs. But she is so intelligent, she was all the time weighing up the situation and assessing her chances as well.

Mandi and I discussed her progress daily and Mandi reported that she was settling and sorting out her place in the life of her home. Mandi was always doubtful that she would keep her. She maintained that she would teach her the basics and then she would move her on. How could this pathetic scrap ever be a real companion for Buddy? She was nervous and submissive and Buddy needed a full companion and play partner to mend his broken heart. How could this poor little waif ever fill Rebel's big shoes?



We had just had a conversation along these lines when Mandi sent me, the very next day, a picture of the two of them playing together in the garden. Gitere was transitioning into Bella.



Never underestimate the power of an alpha bitch however life has treated her. She was coming into her power ... and how! Buddy is a big boy but she was rearing and wrestling with him, as though she had done this all her life. Once they started, she came on strong and Mandi told me that it was Bella, who pestered Buddy for more and more play.

Mandi began to see how their relationship was developing and how happy Buddy had become. I was trying to persuade Mandi all the time to adopt Bella. Her response was always that she was 'too easy' a dog for her. She could have been rehomed to any experienced owner, she did not need someone like her.

But then I told her not to be so selfish and think of Buddy's needs. By now, it would have broken his heart to be parted from Bella: it would be yet another bereavement for him. So Mandi agreed finally, just for Buddy's sake. The lovers could be together forever, not to mention Mandi herself!

The two were clearly in love but even Mandi didn't know the extent of their devotion until Bella had to leave for the day. She had to go the vets to be spayed and Buddy was bereft. He mourned for her loss all day. The picture below is of Bella comforting him upon her return. As I said, this is a true love story.


And they lived happily ever after ...

Back in March I applied to enter the Great North Run and was lucky enough to secure a number to do this. At that point I decided to do the run for Henry.


A Just Giving page was set up and people started to donate. The final amount raised totalled £1,115!
