

GERMAN SHEPHERD DOG RESCUE

Hello everyone,

Welcome to the first edition of our newsletter for 2018 which is packed full of lovely stories and information which we hope that you will enjoy.

Well, the year has started with a worrying number of dogs that need to find new homes. We were receiving rehoming forms right up until Christmas Eve and they started again in earnest on Boxing day.

So far we have received 220 forms which are way over what we received at the same time last year. This, of course, does not include all the other dogs we take in from other sources such as the pounds. I have to say that many of the excuses for rehoming are becoming pathetic. We have rescued a worrying number of dogs that were either at the vets waiting to be put to sleep or were booked in to be put to sleep. Thankfully many vets now will not just put to sleep and will ask the owner to contact us or they will call us and alert us.

On the plus side, we have received over 650 adoption forms during that same time which is also significantly up on last year. Of course, only about a quarter or a third will go on to be home checked ready for adoption. The difficulty we face though is that everyone wants perfect dogs and we don't get too many of those.

This has been one of the longest, coldest winters I can remember which has had an impact on the number of dogs rehomed so we are all now looking forward to springtime and warmer times.

It will be yet another busy year for the rescue, there will be no let-up and there will be many activities throughout the year to assist in this process. So look out for planned events and we hope that you will continue to support these as you have always done in the past.

If you are not already a volunteer, please consider joining our team, you won't regret it.

I thank all my volunteers for the hard work they put into making this rescue the success that it is, especially over the festive period when most people just switch off and relax.






North West and Central Update by Irene Culverwell



Miracles Can Happen



In December last year East Suffolk Lost and Stray Dogs posted on Facebook. They said that a white GSD had been found wandering by a wonderful concerned couple. They had taken him to a local vets and he alerted the authorities. The dog was given emergency medical treatment and then accommodated at the pound. A part of this process, nowadays, is for the local authority to use Facebook and news of his plight was shared far and wide. The law requires that any dog wait at the pound for seven days, in the hope that the owners can be found. Even then, despite the Facebook effort, no owner came to claim him: he had been dumped at Christmas.

The reason for this became clear very quickly. This poor boy was suffering with an advanced case of anal furunculosis. He had not received any treatment and the stench of necrotic flesh from his infected wounds could be smelled twelve feet away. It seemed as though his case was so advanced it was initially unclear as to whether he could even survive. It was very possible that he would be PTS as he would only suffer and never recover.

But miracles do happen. This boy responded remarkably well to antibiotics. The infected raw flesh on his hind quarters healed and the furunculosis, although still present, was possibly not as serious as first thought. The critical question remained, how much damage had the disease caused internally? The local vet was cheered by the white GSD's progress though, and he began to think that a full recovery might even be possible.

By now GSDR was in contact with all three parties – the pound, the vet and the local authority. We were all liaising and working together for this boy's welfare. During his seven statutory days, it was always possible (but highly unlikely, of course) that his owner would turn up to claim him. In the meantime, GSDR expressed an interest. If he survived, he would become a GSDR dog.

By now, I was receiving reports of his progress. During the week that he was at the pound, his situation improved dramatically. We thought initially that GSDR was taking on an elderly sick dog for a last few weeks of comfort. It was thought that it would be an adoption for an 'end of life' experience. But I heard that, as the days went by, this boy 'dropped years' and the pound thought that he was a quite a youngster. By this time, he was showing actual signs of 'joie de vivre'. What a transformation. Miracles can happen.

So, the day finally came to pick up GSDR's new dog. There was already a home waiting for him and so he was taken immediately to a warm and friendly forever home. His medication had already arrived by post and he came with the well wishes of everyone. He was all set for his new life, if his condition could be monitored and contained.

The crucial aspect was the extent to which the furunculosis had affected his back passage internally. Externally his lesions could be addressed, but if there were too extensive damage internally, then he would still not be viable. His owner gave the vet a huge list of issues to address under anaesthetic, when he went for castration. Thankfully, the requested colonoscopy

revealed that the extensive damage had all been external. His prognosis suddenly was good! This was yet another miracle. GSDR had recently lost another lovely boy, in similar circumstances, when the extent of his illness was finally revealed. He had such damage that the hip bones were visible. But, not so for Teddy, as he had now become! Yet another miracle!

So, Teddy lives to explore his new future. All of that is both daunting and wildly exciting. He is enthralled to be living in a house, as he had clearly been an outdoor dog before. He was quite untrained and traumatised by certain triggers, so he had been abused as well. His major challenge (and maybe delight someday) was to come to the home of a ready-made pack. We think he might have lived with horses, as he has some characteristics and sort of excitability that brings them to mind. But dogs were clearly a mystery to him. How does a boy with his past adjust ever to such a radically different new life?

Well, he has. He is still learning about his new world and getting used to his new reality. He hasn't quite lost the look of a child exploring a Christmas grotto.

He still thinks his new life is a miracle. Such things are possible when people of goodwill work together and GSDR is involved.
