Seven months on and he is an amazing little fella - very good with other dogs and is getting used to the outside world. Everday things like cars and pushchairs terrified him but he's getting there. He's a healthy weight now and his fur has grown back so soft. He stole our hearts - he blows raspberries with his tongue – its funniest thing I have ever seen and he bounces around like Zebedee on his back leg

when he gets excited. He loves his big brothers Boomer and Gizmo and is amazing with our four grandchildren. I don't regret a second of it and our family absolutely love him to bits, so much so that we decided he should stay forever"

Thanks to the generosity of GSDR supporters who raised the funds to get Dooley here to safety, this boy now has a wonderful life just as he deserves.

A day in the life by Julie Wilkinson

As a GSDR Dog Co-Ordinator I work closely with other animal rescue organisations and kennels. A friend at a local kennels contacted me yesterday and asked me if I could respond to an enquiry they had from a local garage owner who wished to get rid of a GSD. When I telephoned the garage owner he said that he was sorted as he was now giving the dog to a man who had a bitch and wanted to breed some pups. I was livid - our problems are multiplied time after time by 'back-street breeders' of this type wanting to make a quick buck. There are enough dogs wanting good homes without producing many more pups to be abandoned when inconsiderate or ignorant owners get bored! I continued my conversation with the garage owner, and luckily on this occasion was able to convince him to re-home properly. After a short consideration the garage owner called back to say I could pick up his dog in 30 minutes. Within 30 minutes I was at the garage where a handsome although



undernourished dog was presented to me attached to a very thick chain fastened around his neck with a nut and bolt. The dog had obviously spent all its life chained up as a guard dog. Even the rough looking mechanics in this back-street garage and scrap yard were wary of the dog and backed away. Taking off his chains I put the poor lad onto a slip lead and GSDR took possession.

I am sure that this boy will need some work to restore his confidence in the human race, but for him the dismay of his first three years of life can now become a distant memory - his name is Zak and for him life begun the day I made that call.

That's something we are all taught from a young age and yet, we still manage to grow into our adulthood doing exactly that.... judging. We really shouldn't and here is a perfect reason why....

Meet Simon. Simon has worked in Security and also with dogs in his professional life but a few years ago fell victim to a work related incident, leaving him with disabilities requiring the use of a wheelchair and mobility cart. He was also left with other medical problems as a result of his injuries.

But this certainly hasn't stopped Simon! GSD - Rio and Rottweiler - Dooley are Simon's best friends. Rescued and rehomed by Simon when they had finished their time as prison service dogs, he has trained them to be calm and friendly dogs. They have helped Simon raise a little cat friend from the age of 8 weeks and with their special doggy sense, lay by Simon's wheelchair to prevent him from falling when he has a fit or seizure. They have learned this themselves... what amazing dogs!? Rio and Dooley are beginning to age and so, Simon felt it time to bring a younger dog into his care so that he (and, of course, with the guidance of Rio and Dooley) might train the youngster to take over their duties when the time comes.

Simon contacted GSDR North East and was home checked and sure, there were initial doubts given Simon physical condition, especially considering that Simon had taken an interest in GSD cross Rottweiler, Jenson.

Now, Jenson, a very young and scared lad had spent the last month, since being saved from the pound by GSDR, in kennels and was extremely nervous aggressive towards people, especially men. Only a couple of our female volunteers were able to approach and handle Jenson without issue, so you can understand why we had our doubts.

But, given Simon's experience with dogs; larger breeds, specifically GSDs and Rotties and a glowing Home Check from a volunteer who, amazingly enough, already knew Simon and had seen him out with his dogs previously, the decision was made by Angela Hargreaves and Julie Wilkinson to give this man a chance. And they couldn't have made a better one!

It took Simon one week to turn our boy, Jenson, around.... ONE WEEK!

Debbie Clayden transported Jenson on move day and dropped off a very scared, very cheeky doggy who was counter surfing for any food he could get his hands on and who wouldn't go anywhere near Simon, even had a couple of little snaps at him. But this didn't faze Simon at all. She was sent these pictures within a matter of days.... And look at the boy now.

Jenson now only touches his own food and water bowls, has never been bothered by the other dogs or the cat and now gives Simon the biggest cuddles. He's one very happy dog.

Jenson went to Simon as a foster, we don't think it's likely he will be going anywhere else.

And Simon is already asking when we are going to send him his next one.

So that is why we should never judge a book by its cover..... You just never know, that book may just surprise you and turn out to be the most inspirational book you've ever read!
