

GERMAN SHEPHERD DOG RESCUE

Well the clocks have gone back and we now face the long dark winter months which hopefully won't be as wet as the last two years. So time for the fleeces, woolly hats, wellies and the muddy wet paws. The weather plays a significant role in rescue as often during a run of bad weather, we see a rise in the number of dogs that need to find new homes.

We are still a few weeks away from the festive season yet the Christmas dog dump has already started. Halfway through October we'd already had over 90 rehoming forms come through, which is rather worrying. Despite the fact that barely a month goes by without a new rescue springing up, the numbers of dogs needing to be rehomed is not decreasing as one would expect. It would be nice if other rescues didn't cherry pick all the nice easy dogs and expect GSDR to take the difficult ones, which increases the financial burden for us by way of kennel bills. We don't ever want to turn our backs on any urgent dog but there is a limit to how many we can help. We do always try to persuade owners to keep their dogs until new homes are found, which is better for the dog anyway. We will continue to work this way and if any genuine urgent cases come our way, we will do all we can to help. If we really cannot find a space, we will help owners find other alternative reputable organisations to assist them. There are many other GSD rescues.

Like many other caring organisations, we are very concerned about Romanian strays who end up in terrible shelters where they have no hope. Last year, hundreds of dogs died because of the severe cold out there - they literally gave up and froze to death. The very young and the very old were the worst affected. GSDR have committed to help just a few of these poor souls and we will ensure that this Christmas, they will be warm, fed and cared for.

We know we cannot help every dog, no matter where it comes from and it shouldn't matter where they come from. If you are a German shepherd owner, you have that dog because of dogs that were imported to the UK, since the GSD is not a native breed here. So for the small minority of shepherd owners who have criticised us on social media sites for helping a small percentage of European GSD's, you are at best hypocritical. Since its inception, GSDR have helped thousands of German shepherds find homes - more than any other GSD rescue in the UK.

I leave you with this lovely story......

Once upon a time, there was an old man who used to go to the ocean to do his writing. He had a habit of walking on the beach every morning before he began his work. Early one morning, he was walking along the shore after a big storm had passed and found the vast beach littered with starfish as far as the eye could see, stretching in both directions.


News from the Central & North West Regions by Irene Culverwell

THANK YOU to all our volunteers in the Central & North West Regions who have been out to home check, assess dogs, do follow ups and help with temporary foster & transport. Whatever you do for GSDR it is very important work for the rescue and our thanks are sincere for responding to any request made by either myself, Mel, Bill or Marv.

This month in particular we have urgently helped four dogs in need to get to their new adoptive homes within hours of the urgent applications and indeed saved two 9 year old brothers from being PTS - they are safely in kennels whilst we try and re-home them.



These gorgeous pups needed to find new homes as their owner had left them in the care of his sister whilst trying to find suitable accommodation, after a family confab it was decided the time had come to re-home Gypsy and Heidi via the rescue. The dogs were up in Carlisle and the ring round started to help get these girls safe, the dogs weren't sisters and quite happy to be either re homed together or individually. Our volunteers Judith and Peter were actually up in Scotland and upon hearing their plight readily agreed to help collect both dogs and start the transportation back down to Evesham. The date and time was agreed and within hours the dogs were starting their journey. Two lovely new Adopters were found and Gypsy and Heidi are happy and settled in their respective family homes.




An urgent call was received to re-home a white Shepherd Ted, a much loved 5-6 year old boy whose owner sadly was now blind and had moved to much smaller premises. GSDR were asked to find him a new home as quickly as possible as losing their precious boy was going to be heart wrenching for all concerned. Within hours of the call, Julie went to meet Ted and his family, sent through the photographs and write up for his Dog Assessment. I was just about to start the ring round to help Ted when Peter called me to say that he and Judith were now ready to adopt again (after losing their much loved girl Dixie, aged 15). How spooky was that call, immediately Judith and Peter were told about Ted they were in their car and driving up North to collect and adopt Ted. The family thanked everyone involved for being so helpful and understanding and likened the re-homing of Ted to pulling off a plaster i.e. the quicker it is done the quicker the pain will go away.



Another application urgently received was from a lady who had temporarily taken in Shadow, again whilst original owner tried to find new dog friendly premises. After a few weeks it was clear nowhere was available and Shadow was put up for re-homing. Thanks go to Helen for processing the assessment urgently and again going back a few days later to organise the meet and handover for this boy.

Shadow is now with his adoptive family and thoroughly enjoying his new life.

Thanks also go to Liz & George who via another rescue had heard the plight of these two 9 year old brothers whose owner had not succeeded in re-homing and had made the appointment with his vet to sadly PTS. Arrangements were made for the brothers to go to the vets as planned, the veterinary nurse kindly agreed to transport the dogs to kennels in Shropshire. Liz & George have been going to the kennels and walking the brothers and building up a picture of how they are around each other and it would appear they prefer to be out and about individually, fingers crossed these boys find suitable retirement homes soon. 

£112 for GSDR.









Over in the Eastern Region.....

We're delighted that long standing volunteer Howard Keeling has stepped into the role of Dog Co-ordinator and Sarah Carrs has taken on the role of Assistant Area Co-ordinator.

We're in urgent need of two volunteer screeners. The screening calls are the fist vital step in the re-homing chain where you discuss the application submitted by the potential adopter to identify if they are suitable to pass forward for a homecheck. The role is ideally suited to someone who doesn't work or works part time, has a good phone manner and is able to use a computer. Full training will be given and ongoing support is also offered whilst the right people settle into the role.

We are also desperate for foster homes with experienced handlers who have lots of patience. We are snowed under with dogs, mostly young and unsocialised who need an experienced home to show them the way. The majority of homechecks that pass recently all seem to need a 'good' dog and the only way to mould these young hooligans into a 'good' dog is in foster with an experienced handler. Here's our top tips for dealing with Firework Fear in your dog:

- Give your dog a long walk during the late afternoon making sure that they go to the toilet and keep them indoors after dark.
- A meal containing carbohydrates such as well cooked rice, pasta or mashed potato may make your dog feel more sleepy and calm.
- Close curtains to hide the flashes of light and turn up the TV or radio to mask the sound.
- Ignore the firework noises yourself. If your dog shows any signs of fear or anxiety do not react it's important never to punish or fuss over your dog when it is scared as this will only make things worse.
- Some dogs may want to hide when frightened, so providing a 'doggy den' may help them to cope. If you know your dog is going to be frightened on the night then set this up in advance so they are comfortable and happy inside.
- Don't leave your dog alone in the house he may panic and injure himself.
- Seek advice from your Vet as there are a number of products which may help your pet to cope.



Adaptil is a product that has been developed to help support dogs through a range of challenging situations that they may face during their life. Available as a plug in diffuser, collar and spray.

Dogs that are particularly fearful may benefit from a noise desensitisation programme, this needs to be undertaken many months in advance following guidance from your Vet or behaviourist.

Don't forget other small animals too: Cats should be kept indoors with somewhere warm, cosy and dark to hide. If your pets live outside, partly cover cages, pens and aviaries with blankets so that one area is well covered from the sights and sounds of the fireworks.



Creature Comforters make a range of remedies for pets, the Relax blend may be beneficial for anxious animals during firework season. I have used these myself in the past with good results.
