On October 22nd they went off to Excel London to Discover Dogs with Lana and her new owner (yes she got adopted too – double reason to celebrate!) as representatives of German Shepherd Dog Rescue.

A fabulous day was had by all, and our very own supermodel lapped up the limelight like a true professional.

Pepa: Anatomy of an Adoption

It all began for me in the way that so many things do here ... with an email from Sarah. 'There's this lovely dog in Spain who needs a home...is there anything we can do to help? They'll pay all the expenses!' Then came the magic words. 'She is a GSD'.

This 'lovely dog' proved to be Pepa, a mature lady who had come to the rescue with another male as a result of a bereavement. They were a bonded pair and the rescue was keen to keep them together if at all possible. It wasn't. Pepa was stressed by all that had happened to her and clearly anguished and scared by the loss of her owner. Her insecurity led her to overbond with her foster carer and she had to be returned to the rescue.

BARC is a small, but very active independent Spanish rescue, in Busot. (Busot Animal Rescue Concern). When I began corresponding with BARC about Pepa, John, the rescue secretary, explained their difficulty to me. In the past they could have been quite confident about rehoming a lovely lady such as Pepa amongst 'ex-pats' locally in the community. Sadly, Brexit had put an end to all of that. Already the fall in the value of the pound was affecting incomes and the general level of uncertainty as to whether 'ex pat' residents would even be able to remain meant that there was suddenly no possibility of anyone taking on another family responsibility. Who knew that there is a Brexit dimension to rescue? Pepa was safe, in that BARC would care for her in their kennels for the rest of her life: but we all know that GSDs need a home and to be able to bond with their human: Pepa especially!

Our hearing of Pepa had involved quite a chain of contacts already. I don't know how many volunteers were involved with this little diva already in Spain - both the rescue volunteers and the kennel staff certainly. But then there was Elaine. She lives in the UK, in Eastern Region, and she is the 'fixer' for BARC, here in the UK. She publicizes the plight of these Spanish dogs and acts as a liaison for them with English adopters, either individuals or, as in our case, a rescue. When the negotiations seemed to falter at certain stages, again, Elaine was there, explaining and facilitating. I wish she would 'fix' my life for me! It was she who contacted Sarah, who then contacted me.

As you will know not many people contact us saying that they would like to adopt an older dog. But as luck would have it, I was at the stage of negotiating an adoption with just such a person and so told her Pepa's tale. She was touched by her plight and agreed to explore the possibility of adopting her, very enthusiastically. Unfortunately, this was not to be. Further research from BARC revealed that Pepa's attachment to one owner might be problematical to her two youngish sons. And so that was not a go.

However, I had already asked Jayne if Pepa could become a GSDR dog. At the very least, she could come to the UK and be kennelled here in the hope of an early adoption. And so I turned to Christine in South East who, bless her, agreed enthusiastically. She has a huge area and more contacts and resources then here in sleepy Eastern. Again negotiations foundered slightly, as Christine was about to go on holiday but had already confirmed that she would be happy to take this forward when she returned. John in Spain was uncertain about the way forward and even advertised Pepa again on Facebook! Further emails flowed back and forward between Elaine, John, myself and Christine as to who was to contact whom and when. But eventually the plan came together.

Christine was always enthusiastic about Pepa and not only agreed that she would kennel her in an emergency but only went and found her an excellent home! A gentleman whom she knew had recently lost his last dog. He had adopted from South East before and had had several older dogs over the years. Pepa would live alone with him and so she could bond as intensively as she wished. We know one gentleman who

will be guarded diligently!

So, how many people were involved in this loving chain of rescue? How many hours of work, not only caring for Pepa herself but in the admin and endless negotiations? I see posts on Facebook saying that adoptions can take fourteen hours of volunteer time. This one must have taken nearer a hundred! I always wonder at all of this with my own boy George who came to me from Romania, again through the good offices of South East. How could anything like this have been possible in the days before social media and the internet? People talk disparagingly of the way in which jihadis are helped by their communication networks. Well, to set against this, in rescue we have our own chains of communication and our very special social networks of goodwill.







Two of our Central region volunteers, Robyn & Will took part in the Great Birmingham Run recently.

This half marathon course took them from the City Centre south towards the world famous cricketing arena of Edgbaston and on to Bournville, the home of Cadbury World (my kind of place!).

They're raised in excess of £900 for GSDR, a huge thank you goes to Kathy for the many, many hours spent at her sewing machine, it's most appreciated.


















The day that tragedy struck the North East by Julie Wilkinson


Monday 3rd October started like any other day and never in my wildest dreams did I think of the devastating message I would receive whilst at work regarding the destruction by fire of Debbie Sharpe's kennel block. Sadly, five dogs lost their lives, three GSDR kennel boys Max, Mitch and Jackson, plus two of Debbie's own dogs a beautiful bonded pair Zeus and Dog.

I cannot explain or really put into words the emotions that were felt when we heard this heart-breaking news, a tragic event which led to Debbie, a valued and experienced volunteer suffering severe burns as she tried to release the dogs, the flames and heat just got too strong.

Everyone at GSDR are devastated at what has occurred. We want to honour our beautiful boys who tragically lost their lives on that day, but take some comfort in knowing that they were loved.

Emma Botwright set up a fundraising page which received over £8,000 in donations from people who were saddened by the news but wanted to show their support. We were overwhelmed by this generosity and it will help with costs such as emergency kennelling and food etc.

The North East team wishes Debbie a speedy recovery and you're in our thoughts.
